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Te Rīpoata a te Hea CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT

E ngā whatitoka o Te Kāhui Maunga, e ngā piharau o Te Awa Nui a Rua, tēnā koutou katoa. Koutou ngā toko o tō tātou reo irirangi ā-iwi, o Awa FM, nei rā te mihi o te ngākau.

It goes without saying that it has been another challenging year for us all as we adapt to life with Covid-19, but I am pleased to be able to bring you a report that highlights a number of gains that have been achieved despite the hurdles that we have faced.

First and foremost, I wish to acknowledge and mihi to you all, our whānau, hapū and iwi across the catchment, who have continued to tune in or lend your time to support Awa FM. Without your support, we would not be here.

You would have noticed some fairly significant changes to the station in 2021. As well as bringing seasoned broadcaster Eruera Rerekura home and launching his breakfast show, we have also started our first flax roots news service with Moana Ellis becoming the first full-time journalist working at Awa FM as a Local Democracy Reporter.

Their leadership and contribution has been a dynamic addition to our airwaves and we are now capturing more of our own stories, and providing the views and perspectives of our own people on a range of iwi related matters and other local and national issues. In June, we achieved a major milestone which was the 30th birthday of Awa FM. The celebration was beautiful, and it was great to have us all – old faces and new - come together at the house where it all began.

At the birthday dinner, I made the point that this milestone was not just a celebration of the radio station, but it was a celebration of our people and our Iwi who have diligently kept Awa FM and all it stands for alive.

We are committed to achieving another 30 years and a key focus for the Executive Committee has been setting strategic goals for the next five-year timeframe.

Our focus areas include capturing more stories from our own people, strengthening our on-air presentation, and taking care of and protecting our archived radio recordings for future generations.

We remain focused on te reo o Whanganui and ensuring the station is a beacon for our reo and mita. To that end, we are developing a bespoke Māori Language Strategy tailored to our rohe to ensure that Awa FM can play a leadership role in the retention and growth of te reo o Whanganui.

Finally, I would like to acknowledge our kaimahi who have been quick to adapt and have shown resilience in the face of Covid-19. Your mahi is vital especially at the moment, and we thank you for continuing to put our people first and get the information out there.

This is the first Annual Report from our newly minted Executive Committee, having just marked a year since we stepped into our roles. At the heart of what we do is a profound love and dedication to te reo o Whanganui, and we are pleased to continue to keep that core foundation firmly planted as we move into the future.

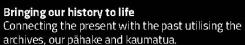

Te Reo Irirangi o Whanganui is the primary media outlet which broadcasts the unique regional variation of te reo Māori, referred to by many Whanganui pāhake as 'te tangi o te reo o Whanganui', more widely known as 'te mita o Whanganui'. This role comes with a responsibility to share high quality reo content and contribute to the preservation and revitalisation of our unique mita.

To provide a little more context for our objectives:

Te Mātāpuna

Te Mātāpuna means 'the source'. This objective is about identifying te reo o Whanganui exponents including pāhake and mātanga reo, capturing their kōrero and sharing it as a normal part of Te Reo Irirangi o Whanganui broadcasting.

Te la

Te ia translates to 'the flow'. This is about broadcasting good quality reo and content that reflects a Whanganui world-view. This is also about improving reo quality along the learning continuum while catering to audiences at various levels of reo.

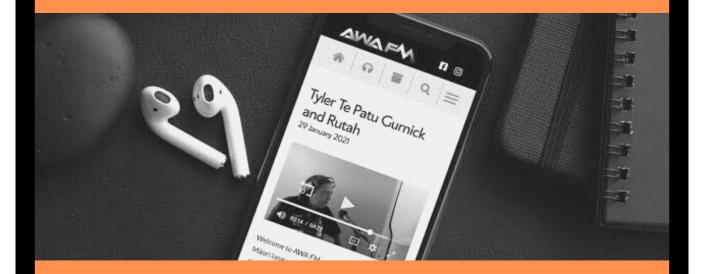
Ngā Paearu

Te Arawaru

Te Arawaru is the sound that water makes as it flows. In Whanganui, our unique reo is captured within pronunciation, kupu, kīwaha, whakatauākī, whakataukī, waiata, karakia and kōrero tuku iho. This objective is about learning and sharing these reo o Whanganui features frequently and consistently in delivery.

Te Paringa Tai

Te Paringa Tai is the high tide. This is about normalising the use of te reo o Whanganui outside of its widely used settings such as the marae, hui, workplaces and kura. This requires te reo o Whanganui to be used in a wider variety of 'natural' everyday domains and for reo 'ōpaki' (informal) as well as ōkawa' (formal) to be shared.

Reo Capacity, Capabilities for an Awa FM Broadcaster

It is desired that all Te Reo Irirangi o Whanganui broadcasters are:

- Confident, fluent speakers of te reo o Whanganui
- Aware of or are able to source reo o Whanganui exponents, pāhake to capture and share their reo and experiences
- Connected to Te Awa o Whanganui and reflect a Whanganui worldview in their reo and content
- Continuously improving their reo and seeking out opportunities to strengthen their command of te reo o Whanganui
- Committed to promoting te reo o Whanganui both on-air and offair

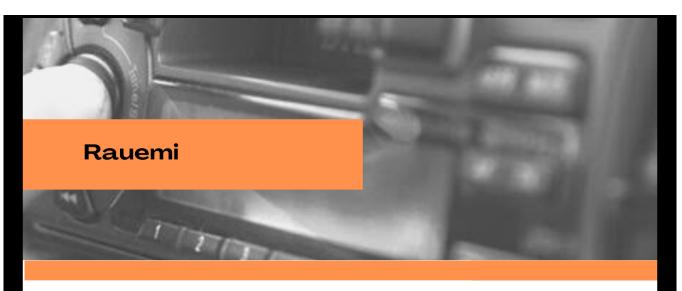
Measures for frequency of Reo

These are in conjunction with Te Māngai Pāho requirements as measured by Kōkako

- Plays 1 or more interview/s with exponents of te reo o Whanganui per hour
- Opens and closes show with karakia o Whanganui
- Uses 1 or more kīwaha or whakataukī/whakatauākī o Whanganui per hour
- Plays 1 or more waiata o Whanganui per hour
- Uses Whanganui whakahua (pronunciation) throughout e.g. softening or dropping of wh/h
- Consistent use of Whanganui names for places e.g. Te Kaihau a Kupe for Castlecliff, Tūtaramoana for Gonville, Kaiate for Durie Hill etc.
- Uses Whanganui kupu (words) consistently e.g. ki instead of kia, pāhake instead of kaumātua, koroheke instead of koroua, whaene instead of whaea, āna instead of āe etc.

Whakahira Ana HIGHLIGHTS

New Breakfast Show



A major highlight of the past year has been our growing ability to capture and share more of our own stories from Te Awa Tupua to the rest of the motu.

Awa FM was fortunate to bring home to Whanganui seasoned broadcaster and news reporter Eruera Rerekura in November 2020 as the Awa FM Breakfast Show host and Programme Director.

The Ngāti Ruakā and Ngāti Tongaiti uri brings with him more than 11 years of experience in radio and four years in television news reporting for Te Karere, as well as a strong rapport and command of te reo o Whanganui.

His show has received positive feedback from Te Māngai Pāho who monitor quality of broadcasting, measure te reo and require a breakfast show from all iwi radio stations.

The show not only has listeners in the Awa FM broadcast regions of Taumarunui, Ohakune and Whanganui but also has reach in Wellington via Te Reo Irirangi o Te Ūpoko o Te Ika as well as online audiences and the Whare Kōrero app.

First Full-time Journalist

Another positive for the station in the past year has been the appointment of Moana Ellis, the first full time journalist working at Awa FM.

In March 2021, the long-time journalist from Ruapehu began in the role of Local Democracy Reporter based at Awa FM, after the station successfully secured public funding for the role.

Moana focuses on reporting stories from local iwi leaders and Maori organisations as well as local government and other public entities.

We are hearing more local Māori news stories and iwi views on local and national issues on air, which has been a fantastic development for the station and for our people.



Moana's stories are published and broadcasted not only on Awa FM, but on other news outlets such as the Whanganui Chronicle and RNZ, maximising our reach and increasing the profile of Awa FM.

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Celebrating Awa FM's 30th Birthday

This year we celebrated reaching a very special milestone of 30 years of Awa FM. It is a wonderful achievement and something we can all be very proud of.



The day was marked with a special live broadcast from a marquee set up behind the station, which was fitting given it was the house next door that the first ever Awa FM broadcast took place on a cold morning on June 17 in 1991.



We opened the event with a karakia with our kaumatua, and throughout the day we had droves of kura kaupapa students joining the live broadcast to sing and share memories.

The announcers did a great job with their special broadcast and birthday event. We got to hear old school announcers make a reappearance on air like Tauira Allan and Tyla Te Patu Gurnick.



The stories and tributes continued into the evening to the birthday dinner. Whānau, past announcers and kaimahi joined the current board and kaimahi to share in celebration of how far we have come.

Statement of Accounting Policies

Te Reo Irirangi O Whanganui Inc For the year ended 30 June 2021

Basis of Preparation

The entity has elected to apply PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For-Profit) on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses equal to or less than \$2,000,000. All transactions in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate in the foreseeable future. The financial statements are presented in New Zealand dollars and rounded to the nearest dollar.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

The entity is registered for GST. All amounts are stated exclusive of goods and services tax (GST) except for accounts payable and accounts receivable which are stated inclusive of GST.

Income Tax

Te Reo Irirangi O Whanganui Inc is wholly exempt from New Zealand income tax having fully complied with all statutory conditions for these exemptions.

Revenue

Revenue is recognised on an accrual basis and is reported in the financial period to which it relates.

Bank Accounts and Cash

Bank accounts and cash in the Statement of Cash Flows comprise cash balances and bank balances as detailed in Note 3.

Debtors

Debtors are recognised at amount owed, less allowances for any uncollectible amounts. Individual debts that are known to be uncollectible are written off in the period that they are identified.

Investments

Investments are shown at cost price.

Creditors and Accrued Expenses

Creditors and accrued expenses are recognised at amount owing. They represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the entity prior to the end of the the financial year that are unpaid.

Employee Costs Payable

Employee costs payable are amounts owing to, but not yet paid to employees. They are measured at the amount owing.

Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are recorded at cost price and are depreciated at rates that reflect the useful life of the asset.

Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies. Policies have been applied on a consistent basis with those of the previous reporting period.
